

I've spent quite a lot of time thinking about the profusion of flags being flown on many lamp posts and what it means to be British. I feel British rather than English, probably because I spent my formative years in Scotland and most of my adult life in England. I'm also, like so many Brits, here as a result of immigration. My great-grandparents

came here at the end of the 1800s or early 1900s. I'm proud of our country and hope I can continue to be so but, for the first time, I feel that our stability is under threat and we need to find a way through, so that everyone feels safe on our streets. It is not for me, especially on these pages to suggest any solutions, but I do think that Feckenham is a place where we are kind to each other and the wider community. Although, I admit, we don't face the same challenges that many towns and cities do, we can be an example of kindness and tolerance: from our next door neighbours, in the village as a whole, the county, country and the wider world. There are some examples of how we help in this edition: the Christmas shoe boxes helping children in other countries, the Christmas card supporting Shelter, and Alma's appreciation of the kindness she has exerienced on losing her dog, Maggie.

Raising the Church Flag

Some of you may be wondering what has happened to the church flag, as it has not been putting in an appearance on the top of the tower for some time. Fear not, it will be back up for the next planned occasion, which will be All Saints Day, 1st November.

Flying the flag actually involves at least 2 people climbing up various ladders inside the tower to access the roof. However. gone are the days when you also had to do a balancing act of walking across the bell frame beams to access the final ladder. For health and safety reasons a new aluminium ladder and platform were installed some years ago in the top part of the tower where the bells are hung, together with a new and safer hatch exit onto the tower roof.



Once out onto the roof, the appropriate flag, which is usually the flag of St George with the Diocese of Worcester emblem in the top left corner next to the flagpole, is attached to the halliard (the rope to which the flag is attached and pulled up into position with this rope sliding through a hole at the top of the flagpole). The problem has been the halliard had badly frayed and it became impossible to get the halliard to move up and down the

flagpole. Fortunately, it was possible to retrieve the flag. Once the halliard becomes fraved the only option is to lower the flagpole in order for a new halliard to be threaded through the



flagpole is then pulled back up into position and resecured.




This is what the intrepid three in the attached photos completed this August.

We have all evolved our work into new areas over the past year, working with new materials, techniques and subject matter, and look forward to continuing this development in



An Organic Allotment by Pete Delaney

An organic October.

So here we are at the pickling, bottling and preserving time of the year. Having pickled shallots earlier in the year and as I write this in September I am about to harvest a good healthy crop of beetroot, also to pickle and put away.

This is my second year producing my own haricot beans in tomato sauce. I leave the beans in the pods on the plants to dry

out. When opened the beans are ripe and ready to cook. Once the beans are cooked I add plenty of my own skinned and chopped tomatoes and simmer until the sauce reaches the thickness I wish.



To store bottled meals, I heat the jars in hot water, remove from the water, put the meal into the jars leaving a centimetre's gap at the top. Put the jars



loose . After 10 minutes remove them from the hot water and immediately tighten the lids shut. Turn the jars over and cover with a cloth to cool. This technique

worked for me to vacuum seal several meals I stored last year. It was satisfying to hear the pop of the breaking seal as I opened each one, proving the vacuum seal was successful. I also bottle and put away several pumpkin based meals.

This year I had a particularly good crop in the brassica net. I grew seven lovely red cabbages that looked like works of art when cut open. Half a dozen greyhound cabbages supplied me with summer cabbage, although there is always a battle with the slugs who like sweet summer cabbage as much as myself. Also I have several green and purple sprout plants forming a good looking crops. I don't get over confident though at this time of the season as previous crops have taught me, pests and diseases can arrive late in the sprouts development. I break off any diseased or dying leaves to try and keep the crop clean and healthy. The poly-tunnel gave me a good season and harvest, tomatoes were a plenty, with the usual jungle to fight with to regulate crop production and let in light. Cucumbers were reasonable, although there were not as many per plant as with previous crops.

I got over my usual annual two or three pepper plants and this year grew eight plants and was rewarded with a good supply of multi coloured peppers.

Well with the seeing out of the preserving season we shall be entertaining the winter months, when the plot becomes all about looking after pre-prepared winter crops and feeding dormant beds. Preserve and keep well.

Rob Cole's Gardening Tips

Unusual Plants from Seed

I very much enjoy growing plants from seed and have grown many interesting things which are not readily available commercially. *Nomocharis* is a genus in the lily family and I first grew it from seed obtained from the Alpine Garden Society Seed Exchange scheme. It is notoriously awkward to keep from year to year, but if

you sow seed every year (and it sets lots) you can replace any losses as they occur. The various species tend to hybridise quite freely and the picture here is of one such hybrid, now in its fifth year.



Another little beauty I raised from seed is *Scilla litardierei*, again from the AGS Seed Exchange. I have not yet had sufficient bulbs to try it in the open garden, but it lives happily in a pot and increases each year. It is commonly known as the Dalmation Squill and in its native habitat in Slovenia it is considered an endangered species. Dozens of deep blue



buds are borne on each stem and open as star shaped flowers in a dense raceme.

It sets lots of seed most years, so is another easy plant to keep going. It is hardy to minus 20°C and has an AGM (Award of Garden Merit)

Many of the smaller primulas are well

and truly over by May, but Primula sieboldii flowers around the middle of the month and comes in a wide range of colours and flower shapes. In Japan it is a cult plant in the same way that



Hepatica is, and collectors seek out as many different types as they can afford. I just grow them from seed and see what I get! I have selected out a few seedlings over the years and they have formed good clumps in the garden. Light shade and a moist soil are important, and they are summer dormant so you need to mark the spot so that you don't inadvertently dig them up.

The one-hour review is carried out by an Approved Driving Instructor (ADI) in the motorist's own car, from their home address, on roads familiar to them, and they can take a relative or friend if they prefer - offering a trusted, impartial appraisal of driving skills.

To receive the subsidised rate, courses must be booked over the phone. This is a limited offer, and bookings are available on a first-come-first-served basis.
